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

DID YOU KNOW

Best practice in medicine not only requires that the caregiver use the least physical restraint necessary, it also requires that the caregiver use the least chemical restraint necessary...



A chemical restraint is the intentional use of any medications to subdue, sedate, or restrain an individual. Chemical restraints have been used to restrict the freedom of movement of a patient—usually in acute, emergency, or psychiatric settings. When we talk about restraint, we are not only referring to the straps that bind patients physically to the bed, we are also referring to the medications which render the patient unable to move or be fully cognitively aware of their surroundings. Sedation, pain medication, and antipsychotics are all used as chemical restraints, and can contribute to delirium and Post Intensive Care Syndrome (PICS) when used excessively and/or in combination with physical restraints.

Best practice in medicine not only requires that the caregiver use the least physical restraint necessary, it also requires that the caregiver use the least chemical restraint necessary. While many institutions have implemented programs to reduce physical restraints, this reduction is often compensated for by increasing sedation to ensure the patient still won't remove or entangle themselves in critical lines and tubes.

The Exersides Refraint is designed to not only allow the caregiver to titrate physical restraint to the most liberal configuration, but also to titrate chemical restraint to the minimum dosage necessary. By assuring the patient is safe from entanglement in IV lines and other equipment while allowing the patient to move freely and not be tied down, agitation and security may be optimized. Caregivers can achieve a more comfortably awake and safely mobile patient.
